WE'RE VOTING NO ON QUESTION 2



THE BOTTLE BILL IS AN OLD IDEA.

In 1983, Massachusetts introduced a 5¢ deposit on soda and beer cans and bottles. Now, Question 2 would expand that deposit to include tea, juice, sports drinks, and water. While forced deposits may have been needed 30 years ago, today more than 90% of Commonwealth residents have access to curbside and other community recycling programs. In 2014, these are the recycling methods most Massachusetts residents prefer.

DUESTION 2 IS EXPENSIVE.

We already pay for curbside recycling. Per ton, forced deposit systems are three times more expensive to operate than curbside programs. Question 2 would expand those forced deposits, costing almost \$60 million a year to collect and handle the new containers. On top of that, every five years the deposit amount we pay would automatically increase.

QUESTION 2 IS NOT ALL IT'S CRACKED UP TO BE.

Beginning in the late 1980s, the bottle bill included an environmental fund for unclaimed deposits. The legislature saw an opportunity and raided the fund. Now instead of helping the environment, unclaimed deposits go directly to the state's general fund. The same could be true under Question 2.

MORE GOOD REASONS TO VOTE NO ON QUESTION 2:

- Because <u>deposit systems are so inconvenient</u>, many Massachusetts residents recycle their bottles and cans at the curb, rather than deal with the hassle.
- The expanded bottle bill will **impose a higher handling fee**, increasing prices on soda, juices, sports drinks, some teas, water, and beer.
- Expanding the bottle bill would **increase the recycling rate by less than 1%**, while costing tens of millions of dollars.
- In addition to levying a 5¢ deposit on more items, Question 2 comes with a provision that increases the deposit on products every five years without a vote by the people. That means **expanding the law will cost much more in the years to come**.
